Participants were welcomed by words from Chief Kane, Chief Executive Officer of Da Daghay Development Corporation, Ben Asquith, and introduced to the consultant team including Joe Glynn (Evergreen Homes), Jack Kobayashi and his team (Kobayashi Zedda Architects),

and Alexandra de Jong Westman (ElknWillow Environmental Consulting). After an opening prayer from Elder Julia Broeren, and dinner, participants came together to discuss and share personal thoughts and feelings about all the things that make you, Ta'an Kwäch'än.

There were some themes that arose from the conversations, and the main one was a need for a sense of place....of home. The role of a home and a sense of place in a person's life story can be significant...even for those who have left the land of their ancestors, a smell,

a taste, a sound, can all evoke strong memories.


