# A Monument for All Time

T'äw Tà'är 'Winter Crossing plaque will mark important Ta'an historical intersection

On August 10, 2023, the Government of Canada commemorated the national historic significance of T'äw Tà'är at a special ceremony with Ta'an Kwäch'än Council to unveil the plaque that will be placed at the site on the Teslin River. The ceremony was held at Ta'an Kwäch'än Council's Fish Camp at Tàa'an Män (Lake Laberge).

T'äw Tà'är has long been an important meeting place on the Teslin River in what is now the Yukon. At the intersection of many traditional travel routes, this cultural landscape, also known as Winter Crossing, represents the interconnected web of seasonal food, family, travel, and trade for the Ta'an Kwäch'än. T'äw Tà'ar was chosen by the Ta'an Kwach'an to represent the broader landscape that connects to their traditional way of life.

The name T'aw Tà'ar means "grayling run up" in Dan K'è (the Southern Tutchone language) and refers to the run of Arctic grayling fish that would take place each spring when the site was used as a fishing camp.

T'äw Tà'är National Historic Site pays tribute to the past and continued relationship between the Ta'an Kwäch'än and their homelands. The importance of the broader landscape not only connects to seasonal harvests of animals, plants and fish, but also the

creation of good relations with neighbouring Northern Tutchone, Tagish, Tlingit and Kaska peoples through marriages, travel, and trade.

"This permanent marker will be placed at the heart of one of our ancestor's core gathering hubs," said Chief Amanda Leas in a media release promoting the event.

"This area remains a cultural landscape rich with history of those who hunted, trapped, and fished in T'äw Tà'är or Winter Crossing. It was a place where many of our relatives lived, harvested, and homesteaded. Only remnants of the original village exist today, but T'äw Tà'ar remains an influential link to who we are as a Nation, and it is a heritage site and sacred burial ground the Ta'an Kwäch'än Council continue to preserve as best we can. This commemoration by the Government of Canada today to place a historical marker at this site represents a huge milestone for our First Nation as we continue to prioritize the preservation of our traditional territory. We want to thank the Government of Canada and the Historic Sites and Monuments Board for this recognition for all Canadians to share."

In late September or early October the plague will be transported by helicopter to the actual site and placed permanently with an official recognition and prayer ceremony led by TKC Elder Betsy Jackson.

# **Priorities for Parliament**

Chief Leas Addresses Rural MPs at special Yukon Meeting in August



and held at the Kwanlin Dün Cultural Centre. Chief Leas, joined Premier Ranj Pillai and Kwanlin Dün Chief Sean Smith to update MPs on matters of importance to each of their constituencies.

Chief Leas offered members a brief history of Ta'an Kwäch'än Council and outlined some of TKC's top priorities, which include land and resource management and housing.

She explained TKC's business arm, Da Daghay Development Corporation, is a proud partner with Yukon First Nation Wildfire, and is leading the way worldwide when it comes to wildland firefighting, and emergency response.

"The crews are among the best of the best and have worked tirelessly this summer. I hope you take the time to familiarize yourselves with their achievements and join us in supporting our call to ensure more support from federal departments is made available to these important First Nation emergency business initiatives. They are on the frontlines here, and they are ready but it's only through continued federal support they will be able to continue to mitigate this new reality and protect our communities."

Chief Leas explained the unique challenges TKC faces when it comes to the desperate lack of safe, affordable housing for Citizens, particularly as Whitehorse's



population is growing faster than anywhere else in the country.

"Our Citizens First Housing Initiative, which we launched last year is just one example of our progress I can share with you today. Starting with two new housing developments within city limits, we will be able to provide affordable, self-sufficient housing for our Citizens and eventually the community at large. We're also including energy solutions right from the initial planning through the life of the homes. This is progress, I myself, am very proud of. Since I became Chief about two years ago, we have boosted our staff to accommodate these projects and are currently busy reaching out to funders and community partners, both at the federal and territorial level, to make these projects a reality. We hope you will support us with these important initiatives."

### A Little Bit of Help Goes a Long Way!

TKC Wellness and Development Department would like to thank Elders Ruth Massie and Rose Irvine who joined our staff to help create several care packages for the evacuees that were displaced from their homes in Old Crow and Mayo this summer. Kwanlin Dün First Nation offered a safe and comforting gathering space at its Nakwät'a Kỳ Potlatch House throughout the evacuation. TKC and other Yukon Nations were quick to offer their support for the hundreds of families affected.

On August 6, the First Nation of Na-Cho Nyäk Dun 's community of Mayo was evacuated due to the severity of the Talbott Creek Fire. On August 9, several surrounding fires led the Vuntut Gwitchin Government to evacuate about 250 residents of Old Crow, many of whom came to Whitehorse. Residents were able to return to Mayo on August 13 and to Old Crow by August 16. Shäw Nithän, Team TKC for all your help!

# **General Assembly 2023**

Yukon Premier addresses General Assembly, commits to strong future by working together

The weather cooperated nicely for this year's General Assembly held on August 11-13 at TKC Fish Camp.

The three-day event was well attended and along with the important business at hand, delegates were offered family-fun activities, including "hands on" glass blowing, live entertainment and lots of door prizes. The food was prepared and served by Takhini River Ranch owners Scott and Jackie Dickson, and was delicious.

Delegates met for three days, and business included reviewing the TKC audit and passing several resolutions. One resolution, prompted by concerns raised by the TKC Youth Council, received strong applause by the Assembly and resulted the passing of a resolution that condemns lateral violence in all TKC spaces. It directs Council, Elders Council and TKC management to ensure workplace harassment and human rights training, lateral violence training, conflict resolution training, and crisis prevention training is made mandatory.

Other resolutions call on TKC's Administration to declare a state of emergency on housing, and develop an emergency preparedness plan to maintain the safety of Council, staff and Citizens.

On August 13, Premier Ranj Pillai attended the General Assembly, which was the first time the Premier's Office was in attendance. He addressed Citizens and also

stayed to answer questions covering areas including economic development opportunities for TKC and territorial support for TKC's new housing initiative.

"Your Nation's doing great work. We've gone through our cabinet process and the land title opportunities; only a handful of Nations have been as progressive as you and got that completed. Now we'll wait for Canada to finish off their amendments I believe to your agreement, and then we will continue that work. We were very supportive of that." Premier Pillai said, adding, he is following TKC's Citizens First Housing Initiative closely and sees a strong working relationship ahead.

"Housing wise, I know there's been some work under way - our commitment will continue, whether its to work with the Nation or the Development Corporation to "de-risk" projects, for us to come in a lease space that we can then use for affordable housing or for us to get a place where we can help offset the costs that you have as you build out your own neighbourhoods and your own subdivisions."
